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EDUCATION, contd....

Are you a wool handler, work in a scour or other wool related employment and are wanting to further your knowledge and increase your prospective future employment opportunities? If so you may be interested in completing the **Certificate in Wool Technology** program that was developed by Lincoln University and now presented by the agriculture provider, Taratahi.

Successful completion of this course is a prerequisite to obtaining a 'P' stencil (provisional classer), and followed by a professional wool classing stencil.

The Certificate is a two year, four course/paper distant learning program, whereby students receive modules along with assessment booklets, and answer a set of assignment questions for each course.

The four courses are:

- 1) Wool value chain: Wool production, sheep breeds, organisations within the industry, wool processing systems.
- 2) Wool Classification: assessment of wool parameter (fineness, yield, colour, length & strength), oddment identification, grading & classing. Includes a practical block course in each of the South & North Islands.
- 3) Working in the wool industry: Classing systems in NZ & Australia, Quality systems, staff supervision, professional ethical standards, Health & Safety, working with other cultures.
- 4) Computing & Communication: necessary skills to assist, now and in the future.

Enrolments are now being received for 2019. The total cost is approx. \$1400. (\$700/yr, \$350 per course).

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


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Work Safe


